First Year	
Transition and adjustment Before School Begins:	
Check for and clear all holds via Tritonlink	
Go to TritonLink Tools $\rightarrow$ Click "Holds" under "Classes and Enrollment"	
□ Visit and explore the <u>Virtual Advising Center</u>	
Check "Enrollment Guidance" on left side column for course recommendations in August	
Use "Ask A Question" to communicate with ERC and other departments	
Take any necessary placement exams before enrollment in August (Math, Chem, AWPE)	
Make a habit of checking your UCSD email daily (Refer to this webpage if you need help setting up)	
Verify your schedule through WebReg on TritonLink	
Make sure you are in <u>at least 12</u> units ( three courses) to meet <u>minimum progress requirements</u>	
Check that you are taking courses for a letter grade under "Grading Option"	
Get Involved! Explore student organizations at <u>Welcome Week</u>	
Find <u>at least one or two</u> that interest you and plan on attending the first meeting!	
□ Find community by connecting with the UCSD Campus Community Centers	
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When school begins and throughout your first year:	
Satisfy the Entry Level Writing Requirement	
Complete MMW 11, 12, and 13, if you have met ELWR.	
Review your Degree Audit (through TritonLink Tools) for <u>ERC General Education</u> and <u>University Requirements</u>	
If you have questions, check out our <u>videos</u> explaining them	
Complete Academic Integrity tutorial (more information on your Triton Checklist)	
Take note of deadlines and University regulations on TritonLink	
Explore this information in the "Academics" Tab ex. What are the deadlines for dropping classes? and	
What is the policy and procedure for the P/NP grading option? Consider a Freshman Seminar	
Review your Four Year Plan to make adjustments according to your specific record. Then in Winter or Spring:	
Meet with your major advisor first to review this plan and are on track to meet major requirements	
<ul> <li>Meet with your major advisor instance to review this plan and are on track to meet major requirements</li> <li>Meet with an ERC advisor to check GE requirements and complete creating this Long Term Plan</li> </ul>	
Explore and possibly make use of the <u>Teaching &amp; Learning Commons</u> (T&LC) and <u>OASIS</u>	
The T&LC is a great resource for support in writing papers, content tutoring and supplemental	
instruction in many lower division math, Econ and science courses!	
OASIS provides Academic Resources in Math, Science, and Language Arts as well as Enrichment	
programs specific to First Years.	
Attend office hours with faculty and Teaching Assistants to clarify doubts and get to know them!	
ERC Peer Advisor's <u>Tips On Communicating with Professors</u>	
If you want to apply to a <u>capped major</u> , check out that department's website to learn about criteria to apply	
If you are an <u>undeclared major</u> , begin exploring major options by taking courses, reviewing major	
requirements in the <u>catalog</u> and department websites, and connect with major advisors (via the VAC)	
If you are experiencing personal or academic difficulties, use <u>CAPs</u> and <u>ERC Academic Advising</u>	
Try to connect with at least two students taking some of your courses and form study groups!	
Learn more about and utilize <u>Dine/Coffee with a Professor Programs</u>	
Research <u>study abroad</u> opportunities if interested. Including Global Seminars (we have specific ones for	
MMW), ERC Service Learning opportunities, UCDC and UC Sacramento.	

Second Year
Academic and personal adjustment/identifying goals.
Review your <u>four-year plan</u> . Meet with major and college counselors for questions on planning and meeting goals if you have not done so already or for any change in plans.
Assess your progress in your major and interest if necessary.
Talk to an advisor if considering a change in major and explore options
See <u>Major/Minor Resources</u> on TritonLink
Take MMW 14 and 15 if you completed MMW 12 and 13 (If not, take MMW 12 in winter and 13 in spring)
Research Internships and other experiential learning opportunities
Become familiar with opportunities, workshops, internships and job fairs offered through Career Services
meet with a career advisor to get help with resumes and interview tips
explore job and internship opportunities
learn more about grad school and the application process
assess your interests & skills and think about how they may apply to your career/long term interests.
Meet with professors in your fields of interest to discuss career opportunities.
Begin to develop your <u>co-curricular record</u>
If you are declaring a minor, do so by the end of this year using the Major/Minor Tool in TritonLink
If you are undeclared or considering changing your major, explore options and take courses for your
prospective major to assess interest and move forward with declaring or changing our major
Consider taking <u>Communication and Leadership seminars</u> through the Center for Student Involvement

Third Year
Goal setting, experiential learning and specialization
Monitor your academic progress using your degree audit Reviewing your plan with major & ERC advising.
Explore graduate/professional programs, if that is in your plans, through the Career Services Center
Prepare to take any required professional/graduate school entrance exams
See an advisor in the <u>Career Services Center</u> for guidance
Explore options for independent research through a favorite professor or your major department
Check out the <u>Research Experience and Applied Learning Portal</u>
Maintain contact with favorite professors, exploring career options, and ask for letters of recommendation.
Fourth year
Making the most of every opportunity and transitioning into life beyond UCSD
Review your degree audit and determine your graduating quarter (the quarter in which you will be completing
all your coursework). Be sure to review all aspects including total units required, upper division units, etc.
Refer to <u>ERC website for deadlines</u>
Check out <u>DDA and commencement videos</u> and websites to understand the difference between
applying for diploma vs participating in commencement
Approach faculty and staff to secure any necessary letters of recommendation.
Meet with an advisor in the <u>Career Services Center</u> to prepare for graduate school programs or develop

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post-graduation plans. Attend applicable career fairs.
