Sending Test Scores & Transcripts to UCSD Office of Admissions:

ELECTRONICALLY through:

- Parchment, a safe and secure method of requesting your official transcript(s).
- eTranscriptCA, Credential Solutions, eScripSafe, Scribbles, SCOIR, and National Student Clearinghouse if your academic institution is registered with these e-transcript vendors.

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We'll first begin with discussing transcripts and test scores.

If you sent your test scores and official transcripts to UCSD Office of Admissions by **July 1st**, they should be posted to your UCSD records by the time you enroll in August.

If you sent them **AFTER** the July 1st deadline, you don't need to re-send them but they may be posted late on your academic records.

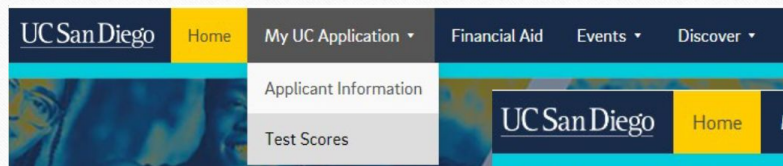
If you didn't send them at all, you may send them by using one of the methods above. It must be sent directly to the UC San Diego Office of Admissions. Please note that the UCSD Office of Admissions prefers electronic transcripts to expedite processing transfer coursework so we strongly recommend that method if you have the option. Be sure to submit as soon as possible.

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From there, you can also see a display of your self-reported and official test scores on file.

How to Check if Transcripts are RECEIVED:

OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS RECEIVED

Upon receipt of official transcripts, it can take up to 10 business days before transcripts will display as received below. If you do not see a transcript you ordered as received after allowing processing time, please contact your school to confirm it was sent and if not, re-order the transcript. When we receive an official transcript, the name of the academic institution and the date it was received will display below. If you attended multiple high schools and your high school of graduation has reported your previous institution's coursework and grades on their transcript, we will only indicate your high school of graduation as received.

If you have concerns about receipt of your transcripts, or your name is different on your transcript than your UC application, or the name of your academic institution is not listed, please email us: receiptoftranscript@ad.ucsd.edu or contact the Operations Unit at (858) 534-4208 between 12 noon - 4:30 pm PT.

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There is also a specific area where you are check if your official transcripts have been received. Please remember that although your transcript may have been received, it may still be in the process of being evaluated by the Admissions Office but they will try to get your classes posted before enrollment. We will go over what steps to take in our next webinar series about the “Enrollment Guidance” if your classes are not posted by your fall enrollment.

How to send AP Scores:

If you took Advanced Placement exams that are not currently reflected in your Triton Checklist (under the Tests and Transcripts area) please follow these steps immediately:

1. Sign into My AP using your College Board account username and password.
2. Select the link for My AP Profile.
3. Click on the tab that says “Score Send”.

Confirm you are using school code 004836 to have them sent to UC San Diego

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If you took Advanced Placement exams that are not currently reflected in your Triton Checklist (under the Tests and Transcripts area) please follow these steps immediately:

1. Sign into My AP using your College Board account username and password.
2. Select the link for My AP Profile.
3. Click on the tab that says “Score Send”.

Confirm you are using school code 004836 to have them sent to UC San Diego

Receipt of these scores may affect your Fall course enrollment options. Some of these scores serve as “prerequisites” that allow you to enroll in appropriate courses. If you took AP Exams in June, you should still follow the steps above to ensure your scores are sent as soon as they are released. Similarly to what was mentioned before, sometimes there are things outside of our control, such as College Board being delayed in sending the scores over. If this occurs, and you do not have your scores posted prior to fall enrollment, you may need to submit a Pre-Authorization Enrollment request for certain classes. Again, we will go into more detail on how to do so in our next webinar.

Grades & transcript tools

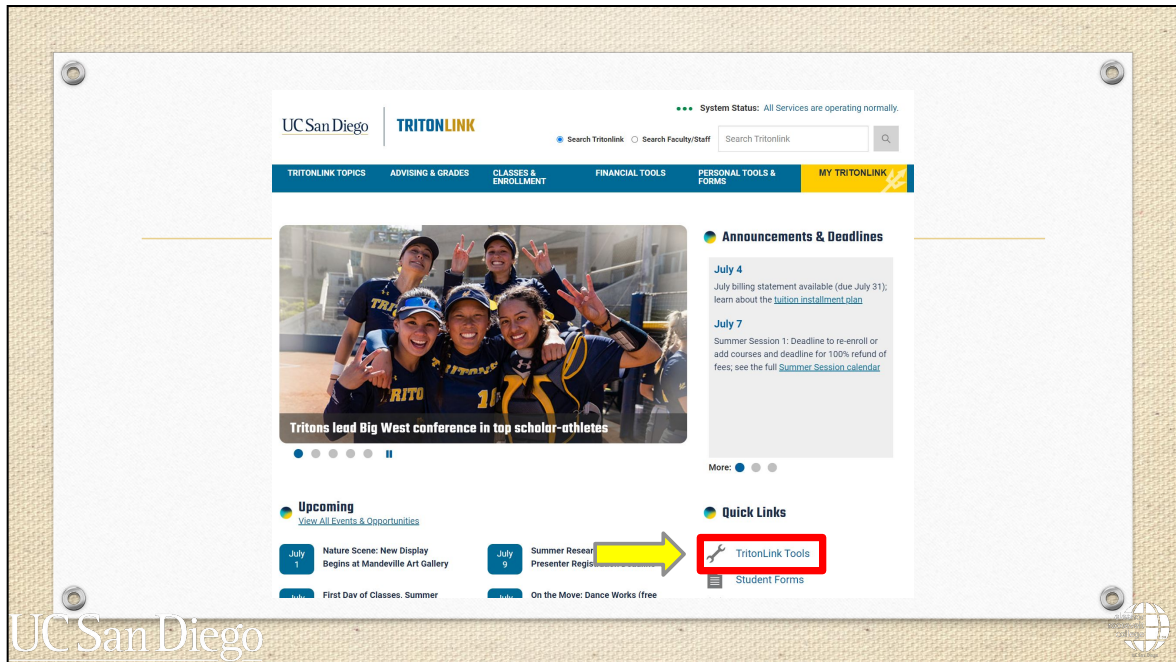
- **Academic History:** See your grades and unofficial transcript.
- **Academic History as an alumni:** See your grades and unofficial transcript using [Social Login](#) after you have graduated.
- **Late Grades Report:** If you don't see a grade listed for a class (10 days after the end of the quarter), check this list, then contact your instructor.
- **Order Transcripts:** Order your transcript online.
- **Order Transcripts as an alumni:** Order your transcript online using [Social Login](#) after you have graduated.
- **Order Verifications:** Order your verification documents online.
- **Track Verification Orders:** See if your requested verification has been sent.

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
To find out if your test scores and transfer coursework have been *posted* to your UC San Diego records by UCSD Office of Admissions, check your Academic History on Tritonlink periodically.

We'll now show you really quickly how to find the Academic History using these steps.

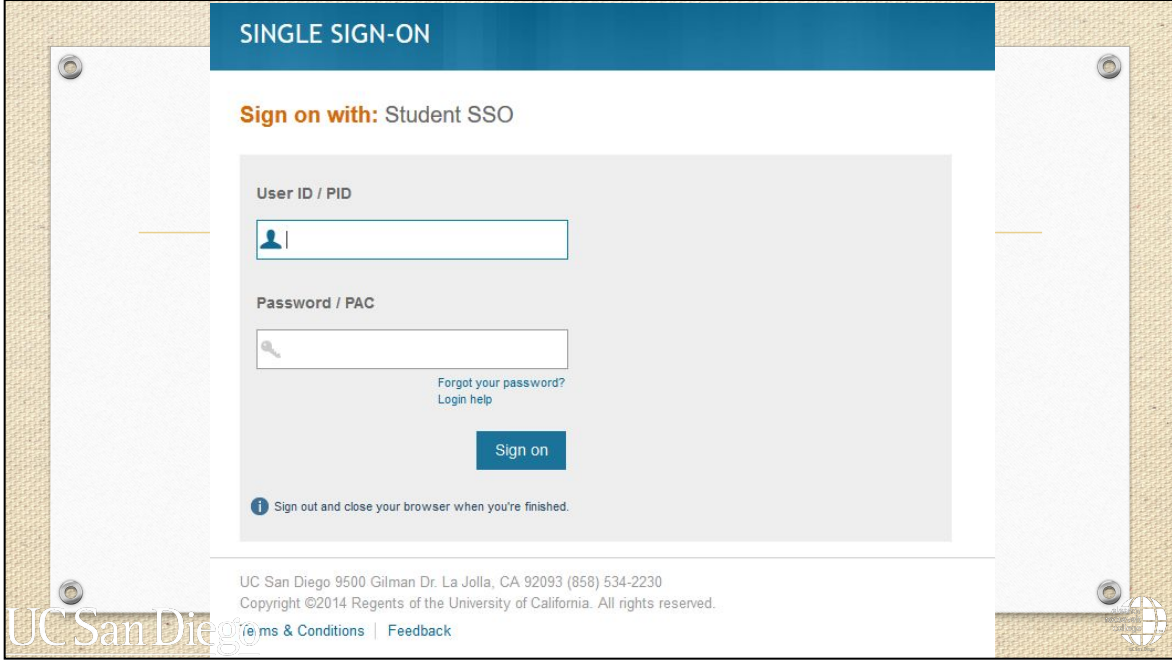


Grades & transcript tools

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- **Track Verification Orders:** See if your requested verification has been sent.


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Scroll down on this page to the header: “Grades & transcripts tools” then click on the Academic History hyperlink.



From there, enter your PID and password and click "Sign on".

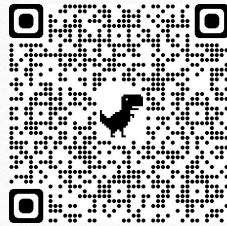

Once you're on your Academic History, you will see posted test scores and transfer coursework listed under the "Transfer Courses" section. Please note that IB scores and transfer coursework typically take longer than AP scores to process and post on your records, but they should be posted by your enrollment time if you submitted them by the July 1st deadline unless otherwise noted. Keep checking your Academic History in TritonLink to ensure it eventually gets posted.

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

AP Chart/IB Chart

Eleanor Roosevelt College does not have general education requirements to which all AP or IB scores can be applied. As shown under UCSD Course Exemptions, Advanced Placement scores and International Baccalaureate scores can earn elective or prerequisite credit toward some majors and toward graduation requirements.

Please read "**Application of AP Credits and IB Units**" *prior* to reviewing charts to understand how to interpret exam scores and credits.

- Students who receive AP or IB credit will not receive credit for an equivalent UCSD course.
- The university grants up to a maximum of 30 quarter unit credits for higher-level IB exams
- Some AP exams are the same subject areas as IB exams. Those are marked in red and students will not receive credit for the same subject areas.

The chart is separated by subject areas. If the AP and IB exams have the same subject area, both will be listed under the same drawer.

Here's how the chart works:

- The first column on the left shows the type of exam.
- The next column shows the score.
- Next to that is the UC units that you will receive based on your score.
- After that, you will see the course exemptions that AP score will give you.
- Finally, in the last column, you will see which GEs your AP scores will fulfill.



There may be a note in red which indicates if the AP exam is the same subject area as an IB exam. Students will **not** receive credit for different tests in the same subject areas.

How to check what Advanced Placement (AP) Credit will give you (cont.):

Note: same subject area as IB Biology

Let's look at a specific example. Here, a score of 4 or 5 on the AP Biology exam gives you 8 units of credit, exempts you from BILD 1, 2, and 3, at UC San Diego, and satisfies the two-course requirement for the ERC Natural Science General Education requirement.

Some of you might think that you may need to repeat courses that your AP credit exempts you from. However, if you are already exempt from a UCSD course through AP scores, you **cannot** retake that class for credit and **should not** enroll in the course.

How to check what Advanced Placement (AP) Credit will give you (cont.):

Note: A yellow arrow points to the score '3' in the table, and a red box highlights the row for a score of 3.

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Some AP scores will not exempt you from a specific class but will meet ERC GE requirements.


For example, a score of 3 on the AP Environmental Science exam gives you 4 units of elective credit and completes one of the two required Natural Science GE courses. It does not exempt you from a specific class at UC San Diego.

Please note that elective credit simply means you will only earn units for the results and it does not give you credit to any specific course.

And, finally, some AP scores will give you elective credits toward graduation, but will not exempt you from a specific course nor from GE requirement.

For example , a score of 3 or 4 on the AP Microeconomics exam will give you 4 units of elective credit but will not exempt you from a specific ECON course nor a GE requirement.

How to check what International Baccalaureate (IB) Credit will give you:

Note: same subject area as AP Biology

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If you took IB exams, scroll to the respective drawer of the subject area to see which courses your IB scores exempt you from. Similar to AP credits, certain qualifying IB scores can exempt you from courses and/or GE requirements.

Keep in mind that only Higher Level exam scores will be awarded credits. Standard Level exams, with the exception of the IB English exam, will not be awarded credit on your UCSD transcripts.

You can use the “Ask a Question tool” in the New Triton Advising site when it becomes available to ask ERC Academic Advisors questions about your specific test scores and records.

Transfer Coursework:

- If submitted them on time to UCSD Office of Admissions, will posted in August if they are UC transferable
- Courses taken at any UC, 4-year institution within California, or outside of California
 - Check UCSD Office of Admissions and Academic Department
- Courses taken at California Community College
 - <http://assist.org>
- **NOTE:** The IGETC Program, Partial IGETC Program, and all Transfer Agreements apply **exclusively** to students admitted as Transfers. These programs **do not** apply to students admitted as First Year Students.

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Coursework from a 2-year institution outside of California or another 4-year institution, may not be approximated to a UCSD course. You should check with the corresponding UCSD academic department to see if the course can count towards requirements or meet a prerequisite.

If you took coursework at a California Community College, use the website <http://assist.org> to see if a course is articulated to a UCSD course and whether a course is UC transferable.

It's important to note that the IGETC Program, Partial IGETC Program, and all Transfer Agreements apply **exclusively** to students admitted as Transfers. These programs **do not** apply to students admitted as First Year Students.

WHAT IS A DEGREE AUDIT?

A digital checklist that displays:

- All requirements needed for graduation
- Courses you have taken and which requirements have been fulfilled
- Which courses you still need to complete

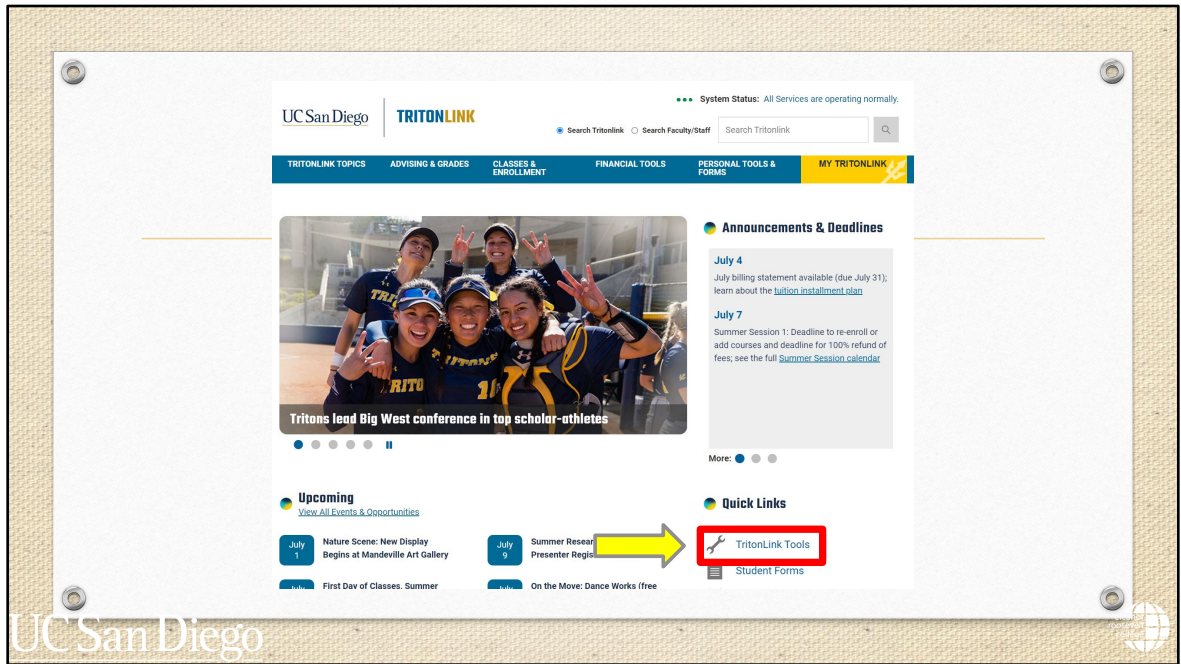

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So, what is a degree audit?

Your degree audit is a checklist that displays all requirements needed to complete the degree. It shows which courses you still need to complete, and shows requirement based on what you have already fulfilled with courses and/or AP/IB credit.

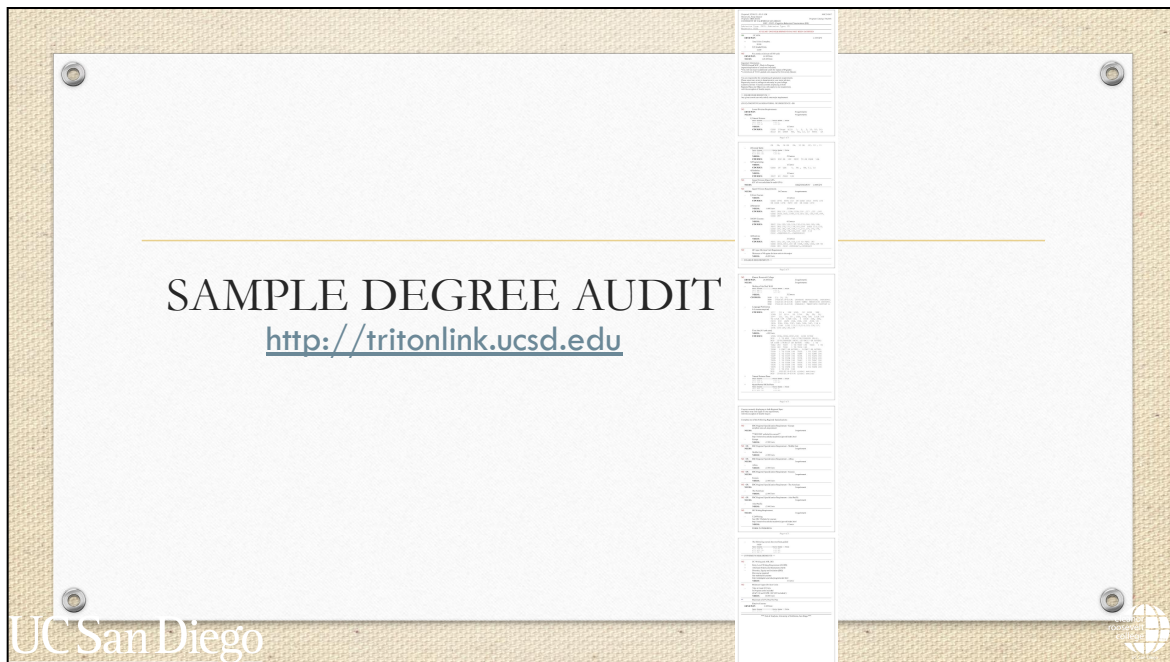

Once it has finished loaded, click on the "View Audit" button in the second to last column. Please make sure that you are opening the latest version.

We recommend running a new degree audit each time so you are viewing the audit with the most up to date information.

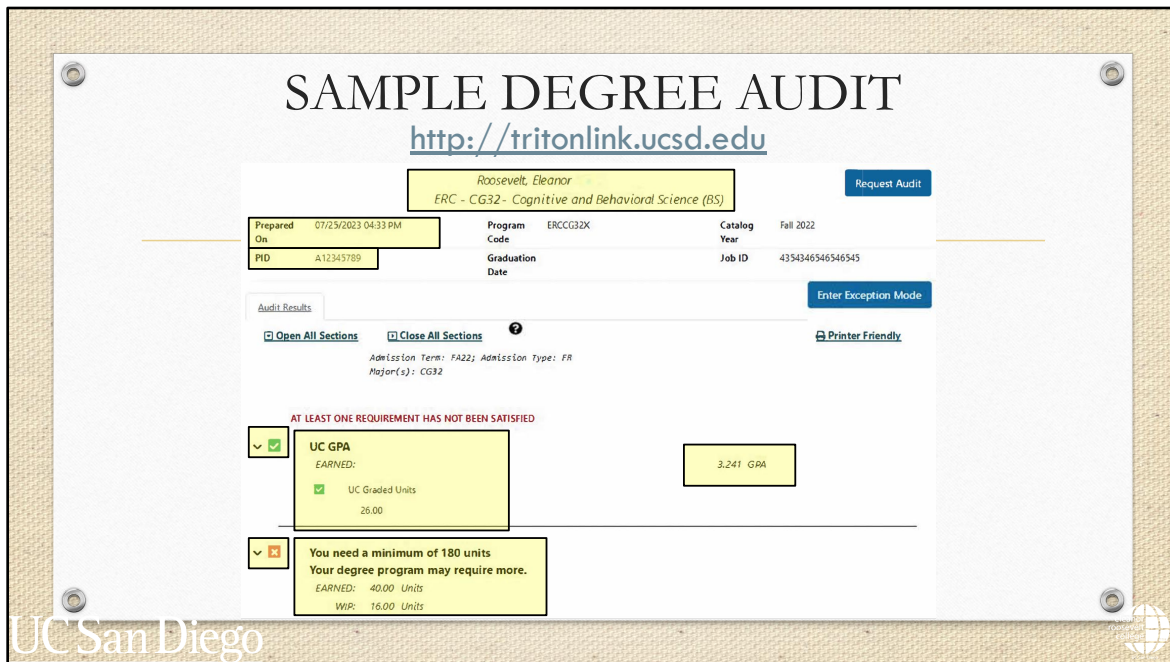


Here's what a full sample degree audit looks like. Degree audits range from 4 to 6 pages long because it includes your major, General Education, and University requirements. In the next slides we will be reviewing the different sections of the degree audit.

If you've received credit from qualifying test scores or transfer coursework, you will see those reflected on your Degree Audit as well as on your Academic History. Make sure to check your degree audit regularly.

As a reminder, your AP/IB or transfer coursework may not be posted until right before you enroll for Fall courses. We encourage getting familiar with the degree audit system and with the other academic tools but continually check back especially once your credits are added to your record. This will help you prepare for fall enrollment.

We will now take an in-depth look at a degree audit.



This is what your audit will look like in an HTML format. Keep in mind that you can also run it as a PDF version, which will look slightly different, but will still organized the same way.

At the top of the audit, you'll find:

- Your name, PID, and your declared major
- Your cumulative UC GPA
- Dnd your “Earned” or total units completed and “Work-in-Progress” units.

On the left-hand side of each section , you’ll see a green checkbox or “OK” indicator if you have completed that requirement or a red X or “NO” if you still need to complete that requirement. You may also see three blue dots which indicates the requirement is WIP.

You can also see the date and time you requested this audit . Make sure to run a new degree audit to see the most updated version. It refreshes every time you run a new degree audit.

Scrolling down, you'll find your Major requirements section. Here, you can find:

- The header for your major requirements
- Courses you've already taken or are currently taking towards major requirements as well as how many courses you still need to complete it
- And course options you can take to meet that requirement

Again, on the left-hand side you'll see **green** checkmark or the word "OK" OR a **red** X or the word "No" to indicate the status of completion.

- the "College Requirements" header
- Courses you have already taken or are currently taking towards those requirements
- How many courses you need to complete for that requirement and course options you can take to meet that requirement

Towards the bottom of the degree audit, you'll find your University requirements section that will show you whether you've completed your:

- Entry Level Writing Requirement or ELWR
- American History and Institutions requirement or AHI
- Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion requirement or DEI

- And minimum 60 units of upper-division courses required to graduate

Now we'll take a look at a student example of how AP credit may be applied to major requirements. We will show you how to interpret AP Credit on both your Academic History and degree audit.

This student has AP credit which is approximated to UCSD courses. On their academic history, it will show that the student's AP MATH score earned them credits that are approximated to MATH 20A at UCSD.

On the degree audit to the right, will show how the credit is applied to a specific requirement. This student's completion of the MATH 20A requirement will count towards their Data Science major. You can see that the student received 4 units for the AP credit which is shown next to a "TP". Please note that the "T" just stands for transfer while the "P" stands for Passing grade.

As mentioned before, you can see the blue and green status indicators. In this example, the blue dots are saying that the student's overall lower-division requirements are currently a work-in-progress. However, the green box, is showing that at least the lower-division Mathematics requirements are completed.

This student's AP Spanish Language with a score of 5 exam, approximates to LTSP 2A and LTSP 2B at UCSD.

The student's degree audit will show their Language GE requirement as completed as the AP exam gave them eligible credit.

The student also earned a 4 on the AP Biology exam which approximates to BILD 1, 2, and 3 and therefore completes their Natural Science GE requirement for ERC.

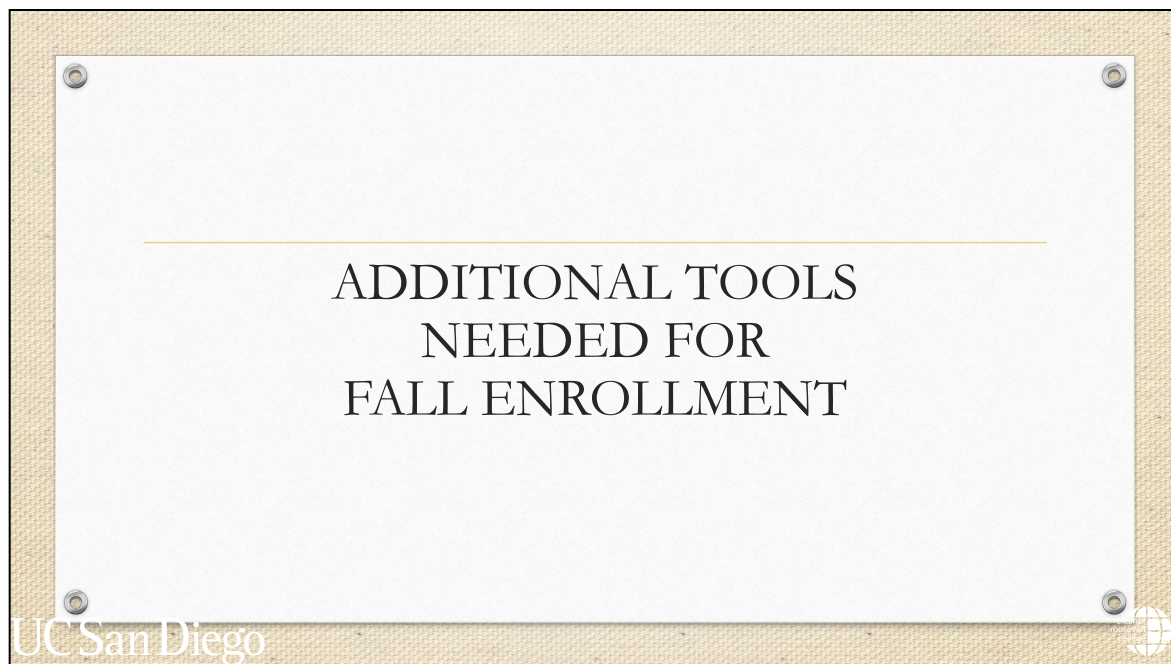

FINE ARTS

MUS 1A. Fundamentals of Music A (4)

Primarily intended for students without previous musical experience. It introduces music notation and basic music theory topics such as intervals, scales, keys, and chords, as well as basic rhythm skills. **Prerequisites:** none.

MUS 2A. Basic Musicianship (4)

Primarily intended for music majors. Development of basic skills: perception and notation of pitch and temporal relationships. Introduction to functional harmony. Studies in melodic writing. Credits in sight singing, rhythmic reading, and dictation. **Prerequisites:** passing score on proficiency exam. *Must be taken in sequence.* Music majors must be concurrently enrolled in Music 2AK (Basic Keyboard).

MUS 4. Introduction to Western Music (4)

A brief survey of the history of Western Music from the Middle Ages to the present. Much attention will be paid to the direct experience of listening to music and attendance of concerts. Class consists of lectures, listening labs, and live performances. **Prerequisites:** none.

MUS 5. Sound in Time (4)

An examination and exploration of the art and science of music making. Topics include acoustics, improvisation, composition, and electronic and popular forms. There will be required listening, reading, and creative assignments. No previous musical background required. **Prerequisites:** none.

MUS 6. Electronic Music (4)

Lectures and listening sessions devoted to the most significant works of music realized through the use of computers and other electronic devices from the middle of this century through the present. **Prerequisites:** none.

FINE ARTS

MUS 19 Blacktronika: Afrofuturism/Electronic Music (4)

Explores the lineage of electronic music's Black pioneers, who have been integral but overlooked in the discussion around the creation and development of house, techno, drum and bass, and experimental music. These musics were developed with sociopolitical movements at the foundation of the sounds. We will investigate the African diaspora lens through the artists' usage of science fiction, technology, and futurist ideologies. **Prerequisites:** none. ***Course can overlap with Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) University requirement.**

TDAC 1. Introduction to Acting (4)

A beginning course in the fundamentals of acting: establishing a working vocabulary and acquiring the basic skills of the acting process. Through exercises, compositions, and improvisations, the student actor explores the imagination as the actor's primary resource, and the basic approach to text through action. **Prerequisites:** none.

TDCE 1. Introduction to Design for the Theatre (4)

A survey of contemporary and historical concepts and practices in the visual arts of the theatre: studies in text analysis, studio processes and technical production; elementary work in design criticism, scale model making, and costume design. A course serving as an introduction to theatre design and production. **Prerequisites:** none.

TDDM 1. Introduction to Dance Making (4)

Explores the concepts and processes of dance making through creative projects, discussions, and the examination of major dance works. Recommended preparation: No prior dance experience required. Open to all levels. **Prerequisites:** none.

TDDG 1. Introduction to Theatre (4)

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Requirement (DEI)

A knowledge of diversity, equity, and inclusion is required of all candidates for a Bachelor's degree who begin their studies at UC San Diego in lower-division standing in Fall 2011 or thereafter, or in upper-division standing in Fall 2013 or thereafter.

Definition of Terms:

Diversity refers to the variety of personal experiences, values, and worldviews that arise from differences of culture and circumstance. Such differences include race, ethnicity, gender, age, religion, language, abilities/disabilities, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, and geographic region.

Equity is the guarantee of fair treatment, access, opportunity, and advancement for all students, faculty, and staff, while at the same time striving to identify and eliminate barriers that have prevented the full participation of marginalized groups.

Inclusion is the act of creating environments in which any individual or group can feel welcomed, respected, supported, and valued.

As previously mentioned, you can find your major's or proposed major's Academic Plan on plans.ucsd.edu. Each major department created a four year plan to help students plan out their four years. Some majors have three year plans as well.

To find the appropriate plan:

- You will select 2023-2024 as the entering year
- then the major department
- and lastly the major code

This major has a four year and a three year plan.

Per the example, students in this major can either take the Math 10 or 20 series. If you have met the MATH 10A requirement with AP credit, then you would take MATH 10B in the Fall. If you have MATH 10A and 10B credit with your AP credit, then you would take MATH 10C in the Fall.
